There are five lists of substances relevant to REACH, each serving a different purpose. When preparing these lists the European Chemicals Authority, (ECHA), often refers to “unique” substances, however each of these could include a number of subservient substances – greatly increasing the totals

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## EU Regulations, Directives and other acts

The aims set out in the EU treaties are achieved by several types of legal act.

Some are binding, others are not. Some apply to all EU countries, others to just a few.

Below are the main methods that the EU uses to convey the compliance requirements that affect our products



### Regulations

A "regulation" is a binding legislative act. It must be applied in its entirety across the EU.

For example, when the EU wanted to make sure that there are common safeguards on goods imported from outside the EU, the Council adopted a regulation.

*eg Registration, Evaluation, Authorisation and Restriction of Chemicals (REACH)*

### Directives

A "directive" is a legislative act that sets out a goal that all EU countries must achieve. However, it is up to the individual countries to devise their own laws on how to reach these goals.

One example is the EU consumer rights directive, which strengthens rights for consumers across the EU, for example by eliminating hidden charges and costs on the internet, and extending the period under which consumers can withdraw from a sales contract.

*eg The Low Voltage Directive, (LVD)*

### Decisions

A "decision" is binding on those to whom it is addressed (e.g. an EU country or an individual company) and is directly applicable.

For example, the Commission issued a decision on the EU participating in the work of various counter-terrorism organisations. The decision related to these organisations only.

### Recommendations

A "recommendation" is not binding. When the Commission issued a recommendation that EU countries' law authorities improve their use of videoconferencing to help judicial services work better across borders, this did not have any legal consequences. A recommendation allows the institutions to make their views known and to suggest a line of action without imposing any legal obligation on those to whom it is addressed.

### Opinions

An "opinion" is an instrument that allows the institutions to make a statement in a non-binding fashion, in other words without imposing any legal obligation on those to whom it is addressed.

An opinion is not binding. It can be issued by the main EU institutions (Commission, Council, Parliament), the Committee of the Regions and the European Economic and Social Committee. While laws are being made, the committees give opinions from their specific regional or economic and social viewpoint.

For example, the Committee of the Regions issued an opinion on the clean air policy package for Europe.
